Each participant will raise their support through InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, and all gifts to their support are tax-deductible. If you are from out of state and need to fly, you may raise the cost of your flight as well. You also have the option of raising more than \$2400 in order to receive a stipend from IV at the end of the summer.

In applying for this internship, I pledge to fulfill the following:

To be willing to be part of this experience by retaining a flexible and non-complaining spirit and be open to new things. To work with staff in making the project a success. To evaluate it afterward to help future participants have a better experience.

To work hard in all service opportunities as unto the Lord.

To submit to the guidance and policies of the agency and/or supervisors with whom I am placed, the director of the internship, and the consensus of the other interns.

To meet weekly at specified times with the other interns and to go through the agreed upon curriculum and any related assignments. To be prepared for these meetings.

I understand that I will be living in community either at the Benbow's house or some other designated housing option. I will be flexible with regard to my placement and living arrangements.

While participating in the internship this summer your focus will be fully consumed by your responsibilities. Interns are asked not to plan any trips away for the duration of the internship. There are no overnight accommodations for guests. Do you perceive any problems with this? If so, explain.

What is your understanding of what it means to be a fully-engaged/committed member of a community? To what degree do you see community playing a part in missions?

******* In order to enhance the experience this summer we ask that interns limit the use of portable electronics such as cell phones, pagers, and computers. (For example, we would ask that cell phones not be kept on at all times and be used only to call home at designated hours. Students serving on a missions trip overseas would not be able to be on their cell phones all the time, and we want you to be as fully-immersed in the summer experience as possible). We are also asking that if you bring a car to GUPY, that you limit your driving at the discretion of the GUPY staff (i.e. only using the car for approved GUPY activities). This facilitates your being more present and immersed in the Glenwood Neighborhood. Are you able to live within these guidelines? If you have questions or objections to this, what are they?**

This internship involves pre-course and during-course reading assignments, which will include multiple articles and books as well as lectures and discussions. Interns are expected to complete all the reading and engage in the discussions. Is there anything that will hinder you in this?
